Can you spare a few hours each month to help with the printing of The STAR? We desperately need volunteers to help with a variety of tasks so please do get in touch.



#### **Christian Perspective**

Now that its eems that we are moving on into more normal times, this is a good opportunity to review our faith and take stock of where we are going. It's time to start pressing on again. *Paul wrote in Philippians 3:13 'forgetting what is behind and straining* 



towards what is ahead, I press on towards the goal to win the prize for which God has called me heavenwards in Christ Jesus'.

Well that's the great Apostle Paul, who after all he had achieved was still straining to press on

to go forward. He didn't feel that he had yet arrived at full maturity in the faith, but needed to keep on going forward, pressing in to the things of Christ.

I have some helps from the Bible which I hope will be of use to us in this pressing on towards the goal. We'll look at the first one this month and others as we go forward. So lets start in Proverbs 4:18-19. I call this 'From brighter to brighter'. It goes like this: The path of the righteous is like the morning sun, shining ever brighter till the full light of day. But the way of the wicked is like deep darkness; they do not know what makes them stumble.

Isn't that an interesting contrast! When we have put our trust in Christ, we are counted among the righteous.

So those who are righteous can be confident that the early pale light of the first days of faith, will

only get brighter as they go forward. The 'path' we walk will have ever increasing light shed upon it.

But those who don't trust in Christ are counted among the wicked. They will stumble about in deep darkness and not know what they have tripped over!

Some years ago we lived and worked in the Seychelles for a while. I used to walk to a fellow worker's house a couple of streets away in the evenings to practice guitar for leading worship on the following Sunday. There were few street lamps, no footpaths and deep storm ditches at the sides of the roads. I really knew the difference between a moonlit night and a cloudy night!


Well, the writer of Proverbs is quite clear here, he says the way of the wicked is like deep darkness.

But we can rejoice because the path of the righteous, starts out like the first light of dawn but gets only ever brighter till it reaches the full light of

day. If we walk with the Lord we will always have light to see where we are going from brighter to brighter!

So that's my first encouraging promise. Look to the Lord afresh each day and expect the light to only get brighter. More next month.

# Scouts and cubs find their way after dark



#### Mark Mounde (aka Skip) reports on the Clumber Park night hike undertaken by Ranskill Scouts, Cubs and brave parents

One of the highlights in the Scouting calendar is the NESST Walk which is held annually on the last weekend of January.

After two years of cancelled events this year's event also fell foul to Covid restrictions one week before the event.

Not to be deterred, the Ranskill Scouts organised their own event as a way of providing an opportunity for the Scouts and Cubs to experience walking at night but in fewer numbers while also maintaining a Covid-safe environment.

As such 40 walkers (two Cub teams, four Scouts teams and one very brave adult team) gathered at Worksop College at 4:30pm on Saturday, January 22 for a staggered time start for the 10-mile Scout walk and sixmile Cub walk into Clumber Park.

Both walks crossed the College grounds and then onto the Robin Hood Way footpath that leads to the main entrance



to the Clumber Park facilities from Lime Tree Avenue.

At this point (with no teams currently lost!) the teams diverged with the Scouts heading south to meet at Check Point 2 on the National Cycleway 647 on the southern boundary of Clumber Park and the Cubs heading off to Hardwick Village for their Check Point 2 (and cakes!).

Both Cubs teams made it to the Finish Point just inside the A614 entrance to the Park in a very respectable time for 8pm while the Scouts continued their journey to the entrance to the Park near to the Clumber Park Hotel where Ed and Izzy Marshall were purposefully manning Check Point 3 (from their warm car!).

On the final leg to the Finish Point the Scouts, some tiring by this stage, were topped up with cakes in Hardwick Village before the final push to the end.

By 9:15pm all teams were safely back and refreshed with hot dogs and hot chocolate provided by Rob and Christie Willis (a big shout out of thanks!).

Many stories were relayed afterwards about kids that hadn't even got onto the A614 before they were sound asleep in the back of their cars which was taken as a sign of a successful, and to be repeated, inaugural Ranskill Ramble.

My thanks also go to leuan, Kelly (who also provided the cakes), Jane and Liz for their help with the Cubs teams and Ed, Izzy, Bear, Mrs Skip, Jonathan and Charlotte for the supervision around the course during the night.

One final mention has to go to the Adult Team (Lynne, Jo, Tim and James) who, reportedly, had to be redirected onto the correct footpath out of Hardwick Village towards the Finish Point by one of the Scouts teams!

My thanks again to everyone who participated and until next time with the second Ranskill Ramble.







In the past, the use of the sites as nature reserves was encouraged, although in more recent times, the sites have been left to wild with many Parishioners unaware that the areas are Parish Land. The areas have been noted as wildlife sites due to the resident and visiting wildlife and birds that inhabit the area. The fauna has also been noted.

The Parish Council has consulted a Wildlife Trust Conservation Officer in order to understand how best to care for and encourage the bio-diversity of the sites which is lacking in its current state. They have documented (please see the report on Scrooby.net) their recommendations on how to achieve this. The Parish Council also have an obligation to prevent the sites turning to wasteland.


The Conservation Officer has recommended the lopping and pruning of low hanging branches; the thinning of self set and other identified trees, the reduction of ferns in the area and the pruning of the gorsebush which is prevalent in order to encourage growth. All of this is to encourage the bio-diversity of the sites allowing them to flourish and be a haven for wildlife for years to come.

A working party is being organised for the 12<sup>th</sup> and 13<sup>th</sup> of March 2022 in order to make a start on the immediate actions recommended. This will be the start of a project to encourage the safe usage of the areas as wildlife sites, and subject to funding\*, the Parish Council also aim to provide additions to the site, such as benches, pathways, forestry areas and appropriate signage to inform users of the history and of the types of nature that can be found there.

We hope these areas will be a valuable asset to the community and encourage you to take a wander and see for yourself, the beauty and nature that is on your doorstep.

#### 6. District and County Councillor's Report

District Councillor Jack Bowker – Reported: Nothing, absent County Councillor Tracey Taylor –The "Soft Devolution" has been granted permission to progress: Levelling Up: a new Freeport: West Burton site to bid for a Nuclear Fusion project. All were discussed and clarified.

#### 7. Finance Report

The Treasurer presented his report, which included basic Village Hall costs and Cinema Club film costs, the report was approved. #### 11. Village Hall

Village Hall Operations: Continues to operate. Additional Grants offered due to COVID do not apply to Scrooby. The Queen's Jubilee 2<sup>nd</sup> June 2022 – Agreed to poll the parish about how to celebrate and to review the provision of a beacon on the Croft.

#### 12. Village Environment

The future development of The Whinze and Gibbet Hill Common – Progress was reported upon and weaknesses identified. Tracey Taylor offered to discuss the project with Notts CC colleagues. It is accepted this is a long term project, the first activity being a clean-up weekend in March. Initial fund-raising applications are being prepared.

The Pilgrim Fathers Memorial – A project team with Notts CC has been created and a formal Conditional Grant agreement is on the table. A possible bridleway from Scrooby to Bawtry is being discussed and is a medium-term project at the "fact finding" phase. It was also noted that Scrooby would be once again taking part in the Great British Spring Clean event this year.

Our D.Cllr is starting training for the new speed watch volunteer team and hoping to start deployment in January.

#### 09/0122: FINANCE

The Clerk ascertained from BDC that a sum of £13,597 is now available to be drawn down as CIL funding and an application has been made to receive the funds from BDC in full.

The Clerk reported that issues with NatWest persist but are very slowly being resolved.

**d**. Budget 2022-23

The clerk presented a revised draft document following confirmation of the new 2022 tax base from BDC.
