A Brief History of Ranskill Bowls Club

The land was donated for the use of the Bowls Club Pavilion. We obtained a second hand mower in time in 1927 by a local farmer Mr L Kitchen. It was to start the 2010 season. In June we officially prepared and run by people who lived in and around Ranskill. At that time bowling could only take place achievement for the Club. in the summer months weather permitting.

During the war years 1939-1945 bowling didn't take had been stolen. We arranged a demonstration and place as the men were away fighting. From 1946 onwards the Bowling Green was used every year. All the maintenance was done by the male members on a Sunday morning. Games and Matches were organised with other clubs and the players were transported by bus - they all paid their own expenses. Return matches were exchanged.

During later years a tennis club was founded and then eventually disbanded due to vandalism, lack of organisation and interest. Eventually water toilets were built and a Portacabin was purchased to be used for meetings and the serving of refreshments during games and matches.

People living in the village donated Cups and Trophies in memory of loved ones or previous members to be competed for by present members. The Browns Cup, from 1939, is still in play.

A building fund started in the hope that we would purchase a brick-built pavilion but the cost proved too much, so an alternative was sought. The Club held money raising events and applied for grants from various sources. WREN Recycling granted us enough money to purchase the present wooden building. This enables the club to be open all year round

Whilst the excavations were being worked on we had the misfortune of having the site broken into, our lawnmowers and equipment were stolen. Luckily we were fully insured and it was winter time so the green was not in use. We now have security on site.

In 2007 we obtained a couple of second hand indoor mats and played at Bawtry Methodist Chapel Schoolroom until our new facilities were available. So Ranskill Bowls Club was now an All Year Round Club.

In the meantime we had received the grant from WREN and continued with the new building which was completed in 2010. With the help of our members we were able to furnish and equip the New

opened our New Pavilion. It was a magnificent

In 2011 we needed to replace the lawnmower that were given prices. It was then up to the members and committee to come up with the remaining cash.

In 2013 one of the indoor mats was in a sorry state the backing was parting from the felt topping and needed replacing. Bassetlaw Council were inviting organisations to submit an application for funding towards helping social amenities for people of any age and ability to meet and participate in enjoyable games. We entered this funding project and were lucky to receive funding for a new mat.

The Ranskill Bowls Club now enjoys games and provides enjoyment to many people over the whole year with pleasant surroundings. During the pandemic we were not allowed to play and it was sorely missed. The Club's Trustees are the local Parish Council, but the Bowls Club is self funding and will remain so until there are no longer any Members. At the present time, we are now trying to get help to clad it to maintain it.

Christian Perspective

Last month we started to look at ways in which we can go forward in our faith as the opportunities open up again after Covid 19.



We began with going from brighter to brighter from Proverbs 4:18-19. This month we're going on to the second help to pressing on in faith. It's from Romans 1:17. I call this one: From Faith to Faith. This is what

the Apostle Paul writes: For in the gospel the righteousness of God is revealed—a righteousness that is by faith from first to last—just as it is written: "The righteous will live by faith."

You know you only need a little faith in a very big God to see amazing things. Do you remember the parable Jesus told about the mustard seed faith? This is from Matthew 13. The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. Though it is the smallest of all seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds come and perch in its branches.

When the disciples of Jesus had trouble dealing with a demon possessed boy while Jesus was up on the mount of transfiguration, they asked Jesus afterwards, "Why couldn't we drive it out?" He replied, "Because you have so little faith. Truly I tell you, if you have faith as small as a mustard seed, you can say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move. Nothing will be impossible for you." That's from Matthew 17.

So we start out with a little faith to believe Jesus loves us and died for our sins. But our little bit of faith is placed in a great big God and the more we get to know him, understand his love and purposes, the more that little bit of faith begins to grow and will achieve great results. The more we put our faith into practice, reaching out to others, the more that faith will grow and we will gain confidence to keep going forward. Because our faith is placed in a mighty God who can do anything, nothing will be impossible for us! When we think of all the amazing things Jesus did as we read them in the Gospels, it's astonishing that he should say to his followers: "Very truly I tell you, whoever believes in me will do the works I have

been doing, and they will do even greater things than these, because I am going to the Father." John 14:12. Praise God!



Let's keep going forward, pressing on from faith to faith, stepping out into those things he gives us to do. God bless you as you go forward on this wonderful journey.
