DONCASTER-BORN CLASSICAL PIANIST APPOINTED PATRON TO NATIONAL ARTS CHARITY

A Doncaster-born Classical pianist has been appointed as Patron to the National Youth Arts Trust, a charity which helps to support talented young people aged 12–25 from non-privileged backgrounds.

Matthew Schellhorn, an acclaimed concert pianist born in 1977 who grew up in Hatfield, has been a leading performer for over 20 years, he regularly appears at major venues and festivals throughout the UK and has recorded numerous critically acclaimed albums. The National Youth Arts Trusts has inspirational Patrons drawn from theatre, tv, film, music, dance and politics who recognise the need for the charity and who help in a variety of ways. Their list includes actors Hugh Bonneville, Sir Derek Jacobi and Ewan McGregor, Labour Shadow Cabinet Member of Parliament David Lammy, and impressionist Alistair McGowan.

Speaking about his appointment, Matthew Schellhorn said: "Studying music demands resources that many talented young learners do not have. My own career as a pianist began in unlikely 1980s poverty-stricken South Yorkshire, when, after numerous local performances in talent shows and care home visits, community figures helped me overcome constraints to undertake higher-quality study than I formerly had access to. I am a passionate believer in widening access to ensure art, and particularly music, can be for all. At a time when opportunities in music are so chronically under-resourced, the work of the National Youth Arts Trust, of which I am delighted to be Patron, is more imperative than ever."

Ruth O'Brien, Director of Operations for the National Youth Arts Trust, said: "We are so excited to have Matthew Schellhorn join our list of inspiration Patrons. We are very grateful for his efforts in helping to spread the word of the National Youth



Arts Trust and our work in widening access to the arts. We thank him for his ongoing support of our work."

Matthew says he enjoys lending his professional profile to several charitable causes, including endorsing social projects, offering support to educational and cultural initiatives, and giving fundraising recitals. Now living in London, he still maintains strong links with his place of birth, as Patron of Doncaster's The Sand House Charity which runs educational activities and projects that have a link to the unique house, carved from solid rock, that once stood in the St James Street neighbourhood. During the Covid-19 lockdowns, The Sand House Charity delivered numerous card model kits to Travis St Lawrence CE Primary School, in order to engage them in an educational project. Commenting on the work carried out by children at his former school, Matthew Schellhorn said. "It is wonderful to know that the pupils of my primary school, which I loved attending, have had this amazing opportunity. I am delighted that they enjoyed making the kits and learning about Doncaster's astounding history".

We've had some very mixed weather in early spring; hail, snow, bone-chilling winds, pelting rain and warm sunshine to mention a few examples. Let's hope that by the time you're reading this, it will be more settled and we can look forward to some outdoor activities. The particular one planned for May is a guided walk around a private woodland that is managed by its owner for nature conservation. This is a rare opportunity to see this wood and some of its beautiful and abundant wildlife.

Bluebells, wood anemones, primroses and celandines can all be seen flowering at different times and birds and insects thrive there. Assuming the weather is good, there will be a picnic in the wood at the end of the walk with a chance to chat and ask questions. The wood is approximately 15 miles from Retford, just beyond Gainsborough and the walk will be held on Sunday 15 May between 2.00 – 4.00pm approximately. Christian Perspective

As we think about pressing on in faith one of the aspects that presents itself is that of going through times of testing. We read in Psalm 84 5-7:



Blessed are those whose strength is in you, whose hearts are set on pilgrimage. As they pass through the Valley of Baka, they make it a place of springs; the autumn rains also cover it with pools. They go from strength to strength, till each appears before God in Zion.

Well, we're all on a pilgrimage, aren't we? Not like those who used to walk miles and take weeks to get to some special saint's shrine. But we're on a pilgrimage, a journey in this life, and there will be times when we go through the 'Vale of Baka', or the valley of weeping. Whoever we are and whatever our life circumstances may be, we will all find ourselves at some time in the valley of weeping, when we must walk by faith and persevere through hard and painful places. God can use these difficult places to birth new areas of strength within us. And a dry barren place can be transformed into a place of springs, from which the river of life flows and new strength is born.

There are experiences through which we must pass if we want our faith to be growing and strong. It's

not possible to gain strong faith if life is always sweet and easy. The facing of trials tests our faith and produces in us perseverance, as James tells us in James 1:2-5. He goes further in verse 12 by saying that when we have stood the test we will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those who love him.

And Peter explains it like this: In all this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may result in praise, glory and honour when Jesus Christ is revealed. 1 Peter 1:6, 7



So **our attitude** should be to rejoice as we persevere, to not give up, to keep on pressing in through the trials and tears. God allows struggles to strengthen our faith.

And **the outcome** is that our faith becomes like refined gold, we will receive *the crown of life* and all the glory goes to Jesus Christ. Hallelujah! May you know the strength of God as you face the trials in your life today.

A Scrooby Mayflower Art Installation



The Plymouth Rock

Visitors and parishioners alike have often remarked on the lack of any significant village icon to celebrate Scrooby's pivotal role in US history. To rectify this great lack, in 2020 Notts County Council planned to install an artwork in Scrooby as a memorial to William Brewster and the Mayflower Julv 2019 In Heidi vovage. Robbins (then Chair of Scrooby PC) and Councillor Kay Cutts (then Leader of Notts CC) identified an appropriate central village site on a vacant space next to the Croft Garden. Funds were earmarked but, due to the pandemic, the project stalled.

In November, Notts CC invited Scrooby Parish Council to take over the artwork project. During the various lockdowns, a wellrespected community artist, Mike Johnson of Styrrup, proposed a stunning idea. Rather than a boat, funereal plaques, or fanciful pilgrim figures, he has selected an iconic image very familiar to all transatlantic cousins. our US tradition claims that 13-year-old Mary Chilton (ancestor of both Presidents Bush) was the first Mayflower voyager to leap onto the Plymouth Rock and then onto the shore of Massachusetts. This 1.8m by 1m chunk of granite is now revered throughout the USA and is visited by around one million people every year. The plan is to use high tech scanning and 3-D printing to fabricate a life -size bronze replica of the will Plymouth Rock which he mounted on a plinth where all the Mayflower voyagers will be listed. A space on the plinth will also include a declaration from the Wampanoag Nation who provided essential support and mutual cooperation during the early years of the colony.

Local school children will design tiles for the path around the Rock and all Scrooby Parishioners will be invited to contribute an item for a *Time Capsule* which will be buried close to the sculpture. The plan is to re-open the capsule in 2120 on the 500th Anniversary.

This dramatic and iconic work will symbolise the enduring link between Scrooby, a small Notts village and the mighty nation across the Atlantic. It will thus provide a spectacular and memorable photo opportunity for all our visitors.

The ambitious plan is to establish the groundworks so that the *Time Capsule* can be buried on the afternoon of Scrooby Show, 3rd September. The completed sculpture will be unveiled on Thanksgiving Day, 24th November.

DISTRICT COUNCILLOR'S REPORT

Council tax for the coming year has been published, with Band D houses up by 2.7%. Band A represents 51% of all houses in Bassetlaw. The Appledore planning application has not yet been heard. One officer from planning enforcement has left, leaving only 1 in post. The Speedwatch group is still being prepared. The BDC litter pick for Ranskill will be on Saturday 9th April, volunteers are welcome.

06/0322: NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The regulation 14 consultation is now closed. Some statutory bodies have responded late and we have seen a small number of resident's comments. We will collate all replies and prepare the final draft NP for submission together with BDC and our consultant.

The proposal for a small industrial development, NP25 will have to be dropped due to a conflict with the new BDC draft plan. We have been advised that they feel that there is sufficient employment land being provided near Ranskill and that there is no need for local industrial land to be developed.
