Christian Perspective



Who Am I? In these days of much social and political change, this is a question we might well ask ourselves! Who am I and where do I fit into this modern society? We come into the world a child of our parents. Maybe we find we are

part of a family with brothers and sisters. In due course we may get married and have children of our own. We find our position in the family changes. It may be we have a career and define ourselves by our work life for a season. But still this question persists. Who am I?

When we put our trust in Jesus Christ as our Lord and Saviour we enter in to a new identity. We read in the first chapter of John's Gospel. To those who believe in His name He gave the right to become children of God. John 1:12. So first and foremost if you are a believer in Jesus you are a child of God. That is your status and it doesn't change.

Then we read some interesting verses in Isaiah. God is speaking and he says to the believers in Israel that they are first his 'servants', then they are 'chosen', and finally 'friends'. Isaiah 41:8.

Now if we are servants, that presumes that we do what someone else requires, not what we want to do. I came across an interesting quote by Smith Wigglesworth recently. When asked how he felt when he woke up in the morning, he replied that he didn't ask himself how he felt, but rather aligned himself with the will of God. In the garden of Gethsemane when Jesus was praying before he went to the cross, knowing how terrible it would be, he prayed, "Not my will but yours be done."

We often think that God exists for us, especially when we are in trouble and have problems. We go to God and expect him to sort things out for us, and how blessed we are when our prayers are answered. But the Bible tells us we are here to obey him and please him and do his will, first.

But along with being God's servants we find this word 'chosen'. How precious it is to know that God has chosen us, not just to care for us and answer our prayers, but as Paul writes to the Ephesians, *In him we were also chosen... that we*

might be for the praise of his glory. Ephesians 1:11,12.

And then we come to the word 'friends'. Jesus is talking to his disciples in John 15:15,16. And this is where he draws all these thoughts together. He says, "I have called you friends, for everything that I learned from my Father I have made known to you. You did not



choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit—fruit that will last —and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you."

How wonderful to know we are children of God, his servants, his chosen ones and his friends! This is the true identity of those who put their trust in Christ.

Puzzle for August

"Your next walk at the Whinze may look a little different. Low hanging branches have been cut back to ensure the pathways remain easily accessible and to help keep lines of sight clear for those who may be walking on their own. As before, the cut branches will be used to reinforce gaps in the hedgerow in an effort to prevent flytipping in the Whinze and to try to prevent access to off road vehicles.

Other branches will be used as deadfall to provide

He has already taken walks around the Idle Valley reserve in June and the Idle Washlands in July. In mid-August, he'll be heading back to the Idle Valley again for his third walk.

The June walk there won him high praise. Lots of birds were seen and identified: Avocets, Green sandpiper, Oyster catcher and many others. Damsel flies and Dragon flies were also spotted near the water. One walker said, "He is one of the best natural history guides I have ever been out with."

RECIPES to try ...

STIRFRY TUNA & RICE - serves 4

12oz long grain rice - cook, drain and cool a little 4 slices bacon – rough chop, fry until golden in 2 tblsp oil 8oz frozen peas – thaw and add to bacon Medium (200g) can tuna in brine – drain and break up gently

Stir all together in a pan until well heated through

1-2 tblsp Soy sauce (or to taste) – sprinkle in and stir well Sprinkle extra Soy sauce to taste

Alternatively:-

Make as above but add diced chicken, to fry with the bacon Add 1 or 2 sundried tomatoes in oil with rest of ingredients

HAM & COURGETTE TAGLIATELLE - serves 4

4 small or 1 large courgette 3 tblsp olive oil 14oz (400g) tagliatelle Plumb clove garlic, sliced 6oz wafer thin ham, cut into strips 3 tblsp pesto

Fry garlic in the hot oil quickly and add sliced courgette Fry to soften then stir in ham then pesto – heat through well Finally add cooked and drained pasta – stir well Season to taste with salt and pepper

Chair's Report May 2022-2023

This year, our biggest change within the Council itself has been the move to having meetings every two months. This has meant that the day-to-day running of the PC has been turned over to our Clerk, but the Chair can call an extraordinary meeting at anytime between meetings, if required. So far, this appears to be a move in the right direction while the village remains relatively quiet -very little has come through in terms of residential planning applications; however, the nearby HIVE application has caused some outcry in the village. We await the decision on that one.

We have continued to invest in the playpark as we now have two portaloos (one of which is an accessible toilet, kindly donated by the Rotary Club in conjunction with the Torworth Playing Field and Events Committee). A pedestrian gate and some more trees were installed, along with a new bench to mark the Platinum Jubilee of Queen Elizabeth II. We have also fitted a flagpole to use during special occasions.

The PC has also been involved with multiple events this past year: in June, we sponsored the Lighting of the Beacon as part of the Platinum Jubilee celebrations. Free teas/coffees, cakes and biscuits were offered to everyone attending, along with glowstick necklaces. The Cadets from the Elizabethan Academy were on hand to help, and fire dancers and a local singer entertained the 300+ crowd before the beacon was lit. Jubilee party bags, including a special 50p coin, were also given out to all the children within the parish.

In November, we hosted another Remembrance Day tea/coffee event, which was enjoyed by many in the village. In May, the Coronation of King Charles II was a huge event and was supported by a National Lottery Grant. A full evening of activities including a Children's Street Party, a vintage solo singer, a band, fire dancers, stilt walker, giant bubble and a BBQ tent were provided. The weather was absolutely fantastic enabling people to sit out and enjoy the sun, visit friends and neighbours while listening to great music.

Looking forward to this coming year, we will continue to work with both District and County Councillors to reduce speed limits within our rural roads and to secure funding for further playground equipment.

• Report from the Playing Field Committee:

This past year has been very busy for our Committee! We helped Torworth Parish Council (TPC) organise the Queen's Platinum Jubilee Lighting of the Beacon evening, then a few days afterwards helped organise the Children's Street Party on the play park. We also helped organise and distribute the Parish Council's Jubilee party bags for all the children within the parish.

05/0623: COUNTY COUNCILLOR AND DISTRICT COUNCILLOR REPORTS

a) District Councillor

Just in office there are no matters to report, other than the D.Cllr is keen to start and promote the speed watch campaign. The Clerk will supply previous files and documents on this initiative.

b) County Councillor

The STEP nuclear fusion has applied for planning permission to demolish the old cooling towers on the site. The Hive Energy pulverised ash project at Idle Valley consultation closes on the 8th of June. There is a possibility of a second consultation if further environmental reports are undertaken.

The National Grid is increasing capacity, not directly in our area, but will mean a further major pylon construction alongside the existing line.

An inspection of pavements in the village has been logged with VIA EM following a complaint from a resident.

06/0623: CRIME AND POLICING

The latest crime figures for the beat of Ranskill & Lound in May are reported as 5 of various types.

07/0623: HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

The traffic volume monitoring strips have now been removed, we await the analysis.

An extension of the 30mph zone on Great North Road is being considered to be extended through Torworth and the 40mph zone similarly extended towards Barnby Moor. The plan appears to show a short 40mph zone from the church to Torworth, the Clerk will clarify this issue.

The Clerk at Scrooby is due to report on their interest to operate a combined speed watch initiative following meetings with the Police.
