

Christian Perspective



So the Christmas lights are on in town and everywhere is beginning to have that bright and sparkly look.

Many things associated with Christmas these days don't really have anything to do with a Christian

Christmas at all. Though some aspects help us to celebrate the coming of the Christ Child. Giving presents reminds that God gave his one and only Son to come to be the Saviour of the world. Many carols speak of the details of the Bible account of the coming of Jesus Christ. Celebrating with food and family is a good way to make the time special. But to me, especially in the winter when days are short and can be dark, the lights are an excellent way to remind us that Jesus came to be the Light of the world.

At the beginning of his Gospel John explains that Jesus, the one he is writing about, was with God in the beginning and came into the world. In verse 4 of chapter 1 he writes: In him was life, and that light was the light of men. The light shines in the darkness and the darkness has not understood or overcome it. And in verse 9 we read: The true light that gives light to every person was coming into the world.

If we feel life is dull and dreary and hopeless the best place to go is to turn to Jesus, find out about him in the Bible and invite him to come and live within you.

Wherever Jesus is and his Spirit is at work, there is light and joy and peace and every good thing we could want. Jesus, speaking of himself, as John records in chapter 8:12 said, "I am the Light of the World. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but will have the light of life." In turn, Jesus said to the ones who believed in him, "You are the light of the world ... let your light shine before people."

The Message version of the Bible puts it like this: "You're here to be light, bringing out the God-colours in the world. God is not a secret to be kept. We're going public with this, as public as a city on a hill. If I make you light-bearers, don't think you can hide under a bucket. I'm putting you on a light stand. Now that I've put you there on a hilltop, on a light stand—shine! Keep open house; be generous with your lives. By opening up to others, you'll prompt people to open up to God, this generous Father in heaven.

Here is David the psalmist writing about his experience, and this is what our lives can be like when we put all into the hands of Jesus: You have turned on



my light! The Lord my God has made my darkness turn to light. Psalm 18:28. So if life seems dark, turn to Jesus. If you know him and his Spirit is in you, let his light shine out. It will make a great difference to you and to all around you.

May God bless you abundantly with light and joy as you worship him this Christmas.

Childhood Memories - Part 2

Continued from Sept '23 Star...

At weekends and holidays we used to go over the level crossing and down Common Lane to where acres and acres of land had been quarried and left. It was a massive area of lakes, ponds and islands that had been reclaimed by nature, covered in grass and wild flowers with swans, grebes, coots, moorhens and mallards. Fish could also be seen in the clear water. It was an ideal place for kids and wildlife.

At this time sand was being quarried in the area near the tyre business and the scrap yard. Mr Glasby drove the drag-line excavator which fed the conveyor that ran alongside the stream to the plant at which is now Mill Grove Farm. We used to enjoy riding on the conveyor belt. One day, part of the plant collapsed and killed two men.

A lot of time was spent at Poplar Farm on Blyth Road run by Mr Kitchen, who always wore his flat cap back to front to keep the rain from running down his neck. I learnt a bit about farming and we also helped where we could. I was 11 when I learnt to drive a tractor, it was a Fordson Major and in the field where Arundel Drive Estate now stands. All the kids in the village, there were not many then, used to play football and cricket in the paddocks as the village park was still being farmed.


Another place we used to go was the Dingle on the corner of Folly Nook Lane. It was just a large hole filled with gorse bushes, ideal for making dens, climbing trees and lighting fires. One day in there I nearly stumbled on a snake, I didn't stop to see if it was an adder or a grass snake.

Train spotting was another pastime, you could buy a book with all the names and numbers in and tick them off as you saw them. At that time you could stand by the bridge on Mattersey Road and have a clear view down to the signal box and the station. The

reason for this was that in summer sparks from the engines set the banks alight, and sometimes the wooden fence, and it kept the vegetation down. I saw all the streamlined engines (A4?) including Mallard and the Flying Scotsman (A3?) which used to come through regularly. If a certain signal man was on duty we could go into the signal box and watch him work the telephones and the bells, and pull the massive levers that worked the signals and the points.

In June the church garden fete was held, usually in the garden of Thorn House, the home of Colonel and Mrs. Brown. There were all the usual attractions, including skittles, lucky dip, treasure hunt and pony rides. As the event was beginning to wind down Mrs Brown, a formidable woman, would get the children to go round the garden picking up litter. After a year or two, we caught on and made ourselves scarce at that time.


