



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Christian Perspective



This is a great time of year, when spring is just around the corner. The birds give us a hint of what's to come; one flies past with a twig in its beak for nest building. There's an excitement among them, an increase in their chirping and twittering. Even the air seems to smell sweeter.

It's a season for new life, birth, fresh hope. I've been thinking about this word 'hope' and what it means. We have a casual expression in English: "Well, I hope so." It just expresses a vague sense of maybe things will turn out as we want. But the Bible tells us that when we hope in Christ for eternal salvation, for everlasting life, it is not a vague thing that we cannot rely on, but rather it's a sure and certain thing. This is how the writer to the Hebrews puts it in Hebrews 6:19: *'We have this hope as an anchor for the soul, firm and secure'*.

Our faith is in the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ. This is where our hope comes from. It's beyond ourselves. We don't have the ability to make ourselves right with a holy God, however hard we try to be good. But what we cannot do Jesus did, by living a sinless life and dying on the cross for our sins. This is where our sure and certain hope comes from—what Jesus had done for us. The writer to the Hebrews has more to say about our response this. He is saying we can have confidence before God because Jesus has opened the way for us. So we can 'draw near to God with a sincere heart and with the full assurance that faith brings'. There's an encouragement here to 'hold unswervingly to the hope we profess, for he who promised is faithful.' See Hebrews 10:19-23.

It's because we come in Christ we can serve God in a fruitful way. We can 'spur one another on towards love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching'. Hebrews 10:24-25. As the national and global news we hear seems to become only worse, so we need to keep on building one another up in our faith and trust in God through Jesus Christ.

It's a great encouragement that we can make a difference to others in growing in faith, helping one another when we go through difficult times, and keeping our eyes fixed on the Lord as we go forward in these difficult days.

Puzzle for March

On Friday 16th February Scrooby Gardeners met for their first village tidy up of the year. One team cut back the grasses and other perennial growth in the garden next to the Village Hall. This is a low maintenance bed which has lived up to its name needing only two sessions a year and providing year-round interest.



Another team set about the Pinfold, cutting back shrubs and preparing the area for its annual mulch. The compost bins in the Church yard were sorted through, removing quite a lot of plastic flowers. It would be



best of these were put in the dustbins rather than the compost bin as they will never rot. The heaps were turned and the rotted leaves which had been swept from the pavements around the village were incorporated. Compost that was ready to use was spread on the Pinfold to promote new growth in the coming year.

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Big Garden Bird Watch at the Whinze, Scrooby 28th January 2024

It was bright, chilly morning at the East Whinze. We took up our places in the new picnic area, poured the tea and waited, binoculars at the ready. We spotted 16 species in the allotted hour. Some were flying around and some perched on the bushes. The list is obviously not typical of usual garden visitors as the Whinze is scrub surrounded by farmland. We didn't spot Harold Scully's tree creepers or the sparrow hawk.

Whinze and Gibbet Hill Update


Project work at the Whinze and Gibbet Hill is drawing to a close. Recent updates include the installation of 2 benches on Gibbet Hill (we're told these are great for bird watching). Along with pedestrian access points and fencing/hedging work to secure the area.

A few areas of pathways have been installed at The Whinze in areas that are prone to get overgrown in summer, or slippery in winter; thus helping to reduce the ongoing maintenance and ensure people can continue to enjoy access.

We're also delighted to say that 8 of the bird boxes that were installed at the Whinze are showing signs of habitation. Local volunteer, Harold, has also made and installed bird boxes at Gibbet Hill, and bird feeders at the Whinze - can you find them?

Childhood Memories - Part 3

Continued from Dec'23 Star...

October was the time for the "Feast" when Tuby's brought dodgems and other stalls into the field north of Bluebell Court. It was eagerly anticipated and we saved up our pocket money for weeks beforehand. A ride on the dodgems was one shilling (5p). It was always known as Ranskill Feast, maybe there was a connection with the harvest festivals?

At that time there was our shop and five more in the village. My mother sold groceries, bread, cigarettes etc. Butter, lard and margarine came in huge blocks which stood on the counter and were cut to order. Sugar came in enormous paper sacks and was weighed out into strong blue bags in 1lb or 2lb or whatever the customer wanted. Oranges came in large wooden boxes with each orange individually wrapped.

About once a month a large cardboard box would arrive by rail from London full of Lyons cakes. The groceries were supplied by a Doncaster firm whose representative called every other week dressed in a dark suit and bowler hat to take the order. Some reps used to come round on a bicycle.

The Co-op was the largest shop in the village run by Mr Birch and is now known as Brompton House.

You could place your order and it would be delivered later by bike. It was also the first shop in the village to sell ice cream. It came in small round pieces, like a mini artic roll, the paper had to be removed and then it manoeuvred into a cornet if you were lucky.

Mrs Green had the shop which is now Willow Lodge. The main thing I remember about Mrs Green was that she had enormous teeth.

The first landlord I can remember at the Blue Bell was Jack Bancroft and his wife Ida.

During the day Jack worked at the Labour Exchange in Doncaster. Then the car park area looked quite different, there was a saddle house, pig sty, a two storey barn and the rest of the yard was filled with stables. Then there was the garden which is now Blue Bell Court. It was always like a wilderness because no-one had the time or the inclination to cultivate it.

One night just before Christmas a lorry driver travelling north fell asleep and crashed into what I think was then known as the smoke room. His lady passenger who had been Christmas shopping was killed and Christmas presents were scattered about in the wreckage. The repairs to the pub are still visible today.

We had always had a piano in the front room and when I was about 12 I decided I would like to play it. I went round to Alice Denman in Station Road who gave lessons for 1s 6d (7½p) for half an hour. I went for about two years then packed it in and have regretted it ever since.

Also about this time, my dad scythed a piece of grass in the feast field short enough to be cut with a mower and we made a tennis court. All the kids in the village played on it but few would help to cut it and mark it out so it eventually got abandoned.

The first TV aerial I remember was on a cottage on Blyth Road. TV's were few and far between in those days and if there was something a bit special on the neighbours were invited in. The curtains were drawn, a small light was switched on and everybody was peering at the small black and white screen.

The Coronation in 1953 did wonders for TV sales but we did not have one for several years later. Funnily enough I do not remember feeling deprived.

When I was 14 I joined the Reading Room, which was open six nights a week in those days. We mostly played billiards, darts and cards. The snooker balls did not come out very often at that time.

We supported the village football team, which most

years played in the paddocks below Poplar Farm.

At the one time a mobile cinema used to visit the village and show films in the Temperance Hall. The acoustics were terrible but we enjoyed it. Another highlight of the week was the mobile fish and chip shop. You always knew when he had arrived as he rang a big hand bell.

Sometime around 1951 the church got a new vicar, the Reverend Sturdy. He was of a different generation to his predecessors and was enthusiastic and energetic to say the least.

Among other things, he started a confirmation class to which I and about five others enrolled. We were confirmed at Blyth Church in 1952 by the Bishop of Southwell Dr Russell Barry and somehow the Reverend Sturdy transported us all there and back in his very ancient Austin 7.

Looking back now, I think growing up in Ranskill was not too bad at all.

Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust North Notts Local Group Talk—Wildflower Gardening



Wildflower Gardening is the subject of this month's talk at the Idle Valley Centre and it will be given by Meadowmaker, Ed Cook. Several members had asked for Ed, having heard him speak previously. They described him as 'inspirational.'

His talk loosely follows last month's exploration by Kieron Huston of what our gardens can tell us about the changing fortunes of insect populations and the role of gardens in maintaining them. Ed will update us on the state of wildflowers in the UK and describe how climate change and habitat loss etc have affected them. He will tell us how residential gardeners can help and show us the results of some UK studies that have demonstrated just how much they can help!

Additionally, Ed will tell us about meadowmaking. He will showcase some star wildflower species and he will bring his wildflower show stall so we can see and

buy some of the plants he has told us about in his talk. This sounds to me like the perfect opportunity for those of us who care enough to want to give our insects a helping hand but are not really sure how to go about it. I'll be there with my notebook and pen at the ready! Hope to see lots of other people scribbling away there too so we in Bassetlaw can begin to make our gardens more wildflower and insect friendly and boost the numbers in our gardens. Now that would be worth doing.

We are really looking forward to welcoming Ed Cooke to the Idle Valley as our speaker at the March meeting. The meeting will start at 7.15pm on Thursday, 14 March 2024. Admission £3 includes tea, coffee and biscuits. All welcome; no need to book.

The Wednesday (Memory) Group The Importance of Friends and Family

I think we all recognise the importance of family. But what about those who have no family?

I get the impression, from the people I know, that there may be quite a lot of them. Admittedly, a good many are elderly so more likely to be alone. Even if they have family, they may live some distance away and, effectively, this cuts them off from an important source of social support and interaction. They are at risk of becoming isolated and losing their social skills. If they have dementia, the risk of isolation increases, often due to embarrassment at not being able to remember people's names.

What can be done? Some elderly people are quite capable of getting the car out and going to visit someone or taking themselves off for a meal at the pub where there's a good chance they'll get talking to someone. Others might need a bit of encouragement. If you've got a relative or acquaintance who seems a bit isolated, why not try getting them to join one of the many social or activity groups around? This magazine is full of them. You may have to stay with them for a while to get them started but if they take to it, it will be time well invested in their happiness.

If you care for someone with dementia or you yourself have a diagnosis or you just want to know more and you think the Wednesday Group might be helpful, do get in touch.


This will start on Saturday 20th April 2024 with a charity

PORK CHOPS WITH PAPRIKA SAUCE - serves 4-6

4-6 chops or shoulder steaks
Dip in seasoned flour and fry golden in 1oz butter
Mix and pour over:½ pint sour cream
1 tablsp lemon juice (or to taste)
2 level teasp sugar
1 level teasp paprika
2 chopped parsley (plenty)
1 level teasp onion salt (or to taste)
Cover and cook to tender (OR put in covered casserole and bake 350°F 180°C Mark 4 till tender)

STANLEYS CHICKEN - serves 4-6

 4 large portions chicken (leg or breast) or 6 lesser

 ½ lb sliced onions
 2oz butter

 ½ pint single cream
 juice of ½ small lemon (or to taste)

 6 sliced mushrooms
 1 level teasp curry powder or paste

 Pinch of cayenne pepper and salt

Cook chicken and onions in the butter for 10-15 mins Mix in curry powder or paste and cook for another 2-3 mins

Add mushrooms and cook for further few mins then add cream, lemon juice, salt and cayenne Cover and cook still tender (OR put in covered casserole and bake till tender as above)
