

The Scrooby Font

Back in the summer. I was showing a US visitor around St Wilfrids and I pointed out the baptismal font. I related, that the original 15th century font, in which Elder William Brewster (boss Pilgrim Father) was baptised, is now in the Wellington Avenue Church in Chicago. The visitor was very interested and, as she lived in Illinois, she said she would pay it a visit. You can imagine our consternation when, just before Thanksgiving (28th November), she reported that she had visited Chicago and the church was closed. Furthermore, the building had been sold.

I did a bit of checking and found that the church was now a synagogue. I emailed the Rabbi and asked of the font's whereabouts. I pointed out that it was a significant US historical artefact. He promptly replied that the previous owner had taken the font with them.

I then found that the Wellington Church was being run on-line by Pastor Ann Louise Haak. I emailed her and she replied, "Fear not the font is well cared for". Due to its size and upkeep costs, the church building was sold in the fall of 2020. Many of their belongings went into storage until they figured out where the next permanent physical home would be. However, she said that it felt wrong to place the Scrooby Font in storage!

The Bethlehem Lutheran Church in St. Charles, Illinois kindly offered a temporary home for the Scrooby Font, and they have been taking great care of it for the past four years.

The previous Wellington Avenue congregation will be voting in January on a new location. Once decided, they will make arrangements to bring the Scrooby Font back home.

Pastor Ann Louise kindly attached a picture of the font in use for a baptism in 2021. As she said, "What a delight to see it continuing to carry on its sacred purpose, despite all the distances it has travelled!". So excellent news for Thanksgiving. Ed Marshall



Christian Perspective—Mercy



It's the easiest thing in the world to see the faults and failings in other people, and to tell them what you think of them. We have

this tendency to be very aware of how we are treated, without really appreciating our own weaknesses and sins. We can always think of things that provide us with an excuse for our own behaviour. but somehow can't see that for others.

There are two interesting and contrasting comments that Jesus makes as part of the Sermon on the Mount. In Matthew's Gospel chapter 7, we find this: "Do not judge, or you too will be judged. For in the same way you judge others, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." We can't expect there to be two different rules—one for us and one for everyone else. So if we judge harshly and are critical of others, we can expect the same treatment applied to

Then we see something of the humour of Jesus when he goes on to say in verses 3 and 4: "Why do you look at the speck of sawdust in your brother's eye and pay no attention to the plank in your own eye? How can you say to your brother, 'Let me take the speck out of your eye,' when all the time there is a plank in your own eye?

This is obviously a rediculous comparison of a plank and a speck, but expresses something of people's attitudes when they can't see their own faults, but think they can put others right.

In contrast to this we read of Jesus saving this in Matthew 5:7: Blessed are the merciful, for they will be shown mercy. The same principal is being applied here in that the way are merciful to others will be reflected in the way God will deal with us. Mercy is a wonderful characteristic which we see displayed in our Father God. Paul writes to the church in Rome: You see, at just the right time, when we were still powerless, Christ died for the ungodly. God demonstrates his own love for us in this: While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. Rom 5:6. 8.

God didn't wait for us to sort ourselves out and get good enough for him, something we can never do. Instead in his great love and mercy he sent Jesus to die for all who would believe in him while we were still falling short of his standards.

So before we judge the person in front of us, let's take a good long look at ourselves and ask God to show us what we are like, bring to him all our shortcomings and sins and ask for forgiveness

and the presence of God within us to live showing mercy to others. God bless you as move on in 2025, thinking of these things.

Puzzle for February

"SAND HOUSE" DRAMA MARKS SOUND PROGRESS

A new audio drama telling the amazing, true saga of Doncaster's unique former Sand House has been released and is now freely available for listeners to enjoy.

Standing not far from the centre of Doncaster for 80 years, the Sand House was a mansion-sized dwelling whose walls were carved from solid rock. Its nearby tunnels, some containing remarkable carvings, largely remained until the 1980s and are still fondly remembered by many.

The new audio drama, produced by The Sand House Charity, marks the latest in a series of projects aimed at providing a fitting legacy for a remarkable part of Doncaster's past, the Victorian marvel that was the Sand House.

The creative partnership of writer Peter Spafford and director Olwen May brought a stage version of the drama to Cast theatre, Doncaster, in 2018. They have collaborated once again and have been joined by sound designer and music composer Nicolas Lewis. With a small company of actors, most of whom also worked on the stage play, they have created a compelling dramatisation of the Sand House story, firmly rooted in

its factual history.

Follow the tale of Alice and Jim, from their wartime adventures in the tunnels to their protest against infilling them, in 1984. Listen in to how the conversation may have gone when Sand House creator Henry Senior explained to his wife, Mary, his vision for the next stage of his fantastical creation. Expect smiles and sadness.

Speaking about his audio drama, Peter Spafford said "Sand House has been a fantastic creative journey for me as a writer, from first hearing the amazing story as told to me by Richard Bell, to the scripting and production of the stage play at Cast in Doncaster, and now to the play's rebirth as an audio drama. Now, via the internet, the play can hopefully speak to audiences far beyond Northern England about ambition and the dreams that are integral to us all as human beings".

Director Olwen May added "The Sand House story is so fascinating. From the very genesis of this project, I always knew we were exploring the achievements of an extraordinary man. However, this is also a piece about creativity, community and courage. It's been a great pleasure to experience the play again in audio form. I hope



audiences enjoy listening to it as much as we enjoyed recording it.".

THE POST OFFICE AT CHRISTMAS

I took over Ranskill Post Office from my father in 1967.

One of the earliest indications that Christmas was approaching was the publication of the latest dates for the posting of mail for abroad. This was necessary as surface mail for places like Australia and New Zealand could take 6 or 7 weeks to get there and was a lot cheaper than airmail.

The surge in mail for abroad usually started in October.

Sometimes people sending a large parcel would come in and ask for an estimate of how much it would cost before they wrapped it up properly. In November we would increase the stock on the shop side and also work out how many stamps we would need for the Christmas rush.

My father used to say in his early days, a person living in a house would send a card to every other occupant of the house by post. Rising costs put a stop to that.

In early December the "Christmas Duties" would start.

This meant extra collections of mail during the day and we could enlist an extra person to help with the delivery of the mail. Also at this time there would be a second delivery of mail at 4pm so some days when the postman had just finished it was time to start again. This late delivery was discontinued in the late 60's early 70's. During this period the letter box outside had to be emptied every 2 hours or it would be overflowing. The mail had to be faced up, date stamped and tied up in bundles with string. This was before first and second class came in.

Anyone wanting bread on Christmas Eve had to order it the week before, this made a lot of work. As it got later on Christmas Eve there would usually be 2 or 3 people who had forgotten what they had ordered and had to be reminded to collect it before we closed.

During those years most people drew their pension in cash at the Post Office every week. In the week before Christmas, 2 weeks pension was payable, which meant calculating how much extra cash would be needed. I got it right most years! As a result of this, the week after Christmas was quieter than usual, apart from the people who wanted their next payment before it was due as they had spent the lot and were broke.

During the weekly visit to the Cash and Carry there was an atmosphere of happy anticipation. In the 90's this seemed to fade away, or it might all have been my imagination.

Overall, I think we got on well with 99% of our customers. If any of the 1% was spotted on the horizon, it was surprising how many urgent jobs cropped up away from the counter.

After the long run up to Christmas and dealing with all the changes that always came in January, a week off in February was always greatly appreciated.

SCALLOPED POTATO SUPREME - Feeds 8 or more

4lb potatoes 1 cup milk pepper, good measure salt

1/4 cup chopped green pepper 1/4 cup grated onion

1 can condensed mushroom soup

Peel and thinly slice potatoes

Layer potato with pepper and onion in a casserole, seasoning each layer

Mix soup and milk and pour over

Cover and bake at 180°C 350°F Mark 4 gas for 45 mins

Uncover and bake for a further 20-30 mins till tender

LEMON POPPY SEED BUNS - Makes 12 buns or 10 muffins

4oz SR flour 1 level tsp baking powder 4oz sugar

4oz marge or butter 2 eggs pinch salt

Beat well together then fold in:-

Rind of 1 lemon 1 tblsp juice 1 tblsp poppy seeds

4 tblsp sour cream (I use low fat yoghurt) Mix to "soft drop" then spoon into paper cases

Bake at 180°C 350°F Mark 4 gas for 25 mins
