## FREDERICK THOMAS PARKIN 1851-1929

Frederick Thomas Parkin was the fifth of seven children born to William and Mary Parkin of Howbrook Nr Wortley, Yorkshire. William manufactured and exported nails and also farmed 164 acres.

Frederick Thomas came to Serlby in 1876 and was steward to Viscount Galway from 1881 to 1919, farming 1450 acres. In 1882 he married Lucy Bingley from Scaftworth Grange at Bawtry and had five children:-

John Bingley born 1883

Margaret Elsie born 1885

Francis Mary born 1887

Frederick William born 1896

Charles Edward born 1899 (my father)

The following is taken from his obituary in the Retford Times on 27th December 1929

"He came to Serlby on the 10th of March 1876, as assistant to his predecessor Mr Masterman with whom he served for 5 years. On the retirement of Mr Masterman he was appointed steward and held the position up to the time of his retirement on 1st January 1919.

He discharged the duties in a manner which won for him the esteem and confidence of all with whom he came in contact. He was a thoroughly practical man and was always ready and willing to give advice and assistance to the tenants on the estate and to his neighbours.

Following in the footsteps of his father, who for 50 years took an active part in public affairs at Wortley, he had held a number of public appointments. He served on several Parish Councils and was Chairman of Styrrup and Oldcotes Parish Council since its formation and had for forty years represented Viscount Galway on The River Idle Drainage Commission.

It was in farming and in all matters appertaining to agriculture that Mr Parkin was seen at his best. He loved the land and everything connected with it and had always kept thoroughly in touch with the latest and most up to date methods of farming.

Many years ago he was a regular exhibitor at local shows, and the entries from Serlby always figured prominently among the prize winners. He did remarkably well at the Doncaster Show and for many years carried off some of the best prizes. On one occasion Mr Parkin won as many as thirteen prizes in

one day at Doncaster, a very remarkable achievement of which he was naturally proud.

The funeral took place at Scrooby Church in bitterly cold and wet weather. The oak coffin was placed on a farm dray and drawn by two horses, was covered by a velvet violet pall with the family wreaths laid around.

After an active and full life, during which he had gained the respect of everyone with whom he came into contact, Mr Parkin was visited with blindness, which perhaps was the most dreadful of all afflictions, but he had borne it with great patience and endurance."

After the went blind and could no longer work, the family moved to Lodge Farm at Scrooby Top, which in those days still belonged to the Estate. Viscount Galway built an extra room on to the farmhouse with a toilet and washbasin.

In the old days he was a Sergeant in the Sherwood Rangers
Yeomanry Cavalry. I gather from the above that my grandfather was very well known and respected over a wide area. In 1929 he passed away in his sleep.

#### Christian Perspective—Stress



Whoever we are, we all come, in our lives, to times of stress and trouble. How we deal with this varies according to personality, character and those around you and

many other things. Some people just become overwhelmed and fall apart. Other people can put on a stoical front, somehow grinding their way through. I've discovered from doing this in my life that it usually leads to sickness in some form or other.

However, if we have faith in God, we can pray and trust things will improve. Paul writes to the church in Philippi: Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus. Phil 4:6-7.

This is a sure and certain promise that everything that happens in our lives and in the lives of our loved ones can be handled in this way. As we bring everything to God, through Jesus, with thanksgiving, it brings the promise of peace. It doesn't necessarily mean that the problems will go away or become less, but because we are trusting in the goodness of God, our way of handling ourselves in the midst of them will be different

When Jesus was speaking to his disciples in John's Gospel chapter 15, he brings the picture of

branches on a vine. He speaks of believers abiding or remaining in Him and in his word. This word 'abiding' means to live or stay somewhere, for a long time—to make that our habitual place for living. It's worthwhile reading slowly and thoughtfully through the first 17 verses of this chapter and then asking the Holy Spirit's help us to put them into practice.

Jesus links this abiding to obedience to him. Abiding in him means abiding in his love for us. He gives believers a new commandment, "Love one another as I have loved you". John 15:12. This is a joyful place to live-receiving the love of Jesus and then giving it away to others. Paul explains in writing to the Romans: God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us. Romans 5:4.

There are good outcomes when we bring our stresses and strains to God in this way. This abiding

gives us a whole new way to live. First there's peace which is greater then anything we can know in any other way. Then there is answered prayer as Jesus explains in John 15:7: If you abide



in Me, and My words abide in you, ask whatever you desire, and it shall be done for you. God bless you as you abide in Jesus.

make others feel welcomed and valued. It shows in their faces and their body language and in the fact that they keep coming back week after week. It's powerful stuff!





## RANSKILL GARAGES

My grandfather, Walter Herbert Choppin, was the son of Alfred and Ellen Chopping who were married in 1868 at Dunmow in Essex. They later moved to Upton in Yorkshire.

Walter was born in Upton in 1880, the second eldest of six children.

Walter came to Ranskill in 1898 to work as a grinder at Skinner and Johnsons Forkworks on Station Road. He lodged with Richard and Caroline Maltkin. In 1903 he married Rose Ellen Winder, Richard's stepdaughter at Ranskill. Sometime between 1903 and 1911 the G was dropped from Chopping. They had four children – Ernest, Doris (my mother) Ron and Cecil.

At some point Rose lost about 50% of her hearing. Despite this she was no shrinking violet, she had a strong personality and could hold her own with anyone.

Walter and Rose were happily married but they did have the occasional row, which due to her deafness could be heard by half the village.

Exactly when Walter started repairing cycles and selling petrol in cans is not clear. An early photo

shows a hut on the sports field with a sign 'North Road Cycle Co'. I think this is probably where he started before moving across the road to the building beside the cottages. As traffic increased, two petrol pumps were installed.

In one corner was a set up where glass accumulator batteries could be recharged. I believe these were used in radios. In another corner was a large drum containing paraffin, which was used for lamps and stoves. The back of the place was filled up with bike wheels and frames.

At this time, when there was horse racing at Doncaster, crossing the road could take some time.

One day a lorry was filling up with petrol when it caught fire.

Somehow they managed to get it into the middle of the road away from the pumps, and when its petrol tank went up in flames is something I will never forget.

During the war, petrol was rationed and could only be brought with coupons. About once a week the kitchen table would be covered in coupons as their value had to be reconciled with the petrol deliveries.

On a Sunday morning some of the locals would gather with my grandfather to discuss the previous week's events.

In the 1940s Walter was beginning to feel the pace. He was a Royal Marine in the first war, was wounded in France and lost part of a lung.

Ron sold his garage and Conisbrough and transformed Walter's place into a proper car garage. Ron was a brilliant motor engineer and could do anything with a car.

In the late 1940s the petrol pumps were replaced by electric ones.

In 1950 Ron's wife persuaded him to take a pub, the Three Horseshoes in Conisbrough, and the business was sold to Mr Wilkinson who lived in the village. Mr Wilkinson only kept it for a year and then sold it to Mr Blow.

Eventually Mr Blow bought the Blue Bell garden and built a new showroom and workshop. It became Rootes Group dealership, and in 1963 I bought my first car from him.

It was a Hillman Minx and cost £634, paid for in £1 notes. At that time I would go across on a Saturday afternoon for £1 worth of petrol and it would usually last me the week

Mr Blow used to drive Allard cars which were sporty and quite rare. Allard cars ceased production in 1960.

At the other end of the village was another garage, where Book Aid is now. It came up for sale in the early 1960s and was bought by Mr Brackenbury.

Towards the end of the 1960s Mr Blow decided to retire and the garage was bought by Mr Brackenbury. It then became a Volvo agency with the workshop at one end of the village and sales at the other.mHe then brought in general manager Mr Speed, who really got the business going. They were really busy and won several awards.

Over the years I had about five Volvo estate cars as they were ideal for my business and the family.

However, Volvo wanted the agency io be in an urban area and not in rural one so Mr Brackenbury built a new garage in Worksop in the 1990s.

They were then looking for a celebrity to open it. Morecambe and Wise wanted £1500 for 1 hour so they ended up with Brian Clough, football manager, who got rather well refreshed and used a lot of bad language.

At Worksop, to remain viable they had to sell at least one car a day. Unfortunately this proved impossible and they went under.

The sales section then became Doncaster Trade Autos, who were car wholesalers who only sold cars to the trade.

After some years they closed, the land was sold and five houses were built and became Bluebell Court.

#### PORK CHOPS WITH PAPRIKA SAUCE - serves 4-6

4-6 chops or shoulder steaks

Dip in seasoned flour and fry golden in 1oz butter

Mix and pour over:-

½ pint sour cream
 1 tablsp lemon juice (or to taste)
 2 level teasp sugar
 1 level teasp paprika
 5 tablsp chicken stock

Heat the oven to 180° / 160° fan / Gas mark 4

Grease and line 2 x 1lb (450g) loaf tins

Put all the ingredients for the sponge into a large bowl and beat well for about 2 minutes

Divide the mixture between the 2 loaf tins and level out evenly

Bake for about 30 minutes until the cakes have slightly shrunk from the sides

Mix the lemon juice and sugar together until blended

When the cakes come out of the oven pour the lemon paste on to both cakes and spread evenly whilst they are still warm

Leave in the tins until code and then remove and take off the lining paper
