

Councillor grant supports The Scrooby Show's 20th anniversary

Preparations are in full swing for the 20th anniversary of The Scrooby Show, a much-anticipated highlight in the local calendar, thanks to support from a Bassetlaw District Councillor.

This year's event will take place on Saturday 6 September 2025, starting at 1pm at the Village Hall. Entry is free, and organisers expect around 450 attendees from Scrooby and the surrounding communities.

A £600 Councillor Community Grant, donated by Cllr Jack Bowker, Ward Member for Blyth, has enabled the hiring of a marquee, providing covered space for a variety of stallholders showcasing arts and crafts.

Visitors will also be able to enjoy a fully licensed bar featuring locally brewed beers, adding to the vibrant community atmosphere of this much-loved event.

Elaine Gargett, Event Organiser of The Scrooby Show, said: "We're really excited to mark the 20th year of The Scrooby Show. This grant has made a huge difference in helping us provide the facilities that will make the day even more enjoyable for everyone. It's a brilliant opportunity for the community to come together, celebrate, and support local artisans and producers."

In addition to the arts and crafts stalls and locally brewed beers, visitors to The Scrooby Show can look forward to a range of family-friendly activities, including live music, traditional games, and a children's entertainment area. Food vendors will be on hand offering a variety of tasty treats, and local community groups will be showcasing their work, adding

Cafe Hub meets on the second Saturday of each month, offering a regular opportunity for


community members to come together in a welcoming environment.

Memory group tackles difficult decisions

The Wednesday Memory Group recently explored one of the most challenging dilemmas facing those concerned about memory problems: whether or not to seek a diagnosis.

The group's discussion revealed the complex emotions surrounding this decision, with one member sharing his personal experience. "I wish I'd never had my memory problem investigated," he explained. "I thought if I knew what was wrong, I could plan for the future but all it's meant is that, when I forget something, I'm reminded of what my problem is and that there's no cure for it."

While the group acknowledged that this approach isn't right for everyone, it highlighted an important consideration for those facing similar decisions. The discussion touched on

the hope that treatments for dementia will improve in the future, which could lift an enormous burden from people's minds as they age.

The Wednesday Memory Group provides support for people who care for someone with dementia, those who have received a diagnosis themselves, or anyone wanting to learn more about memory-related issues.

Sessions cost £10 each, which includes lunch, and first-time visitors can attend free of charge. The group currently has a short waiting list, but organisers encourage people to get in touch as vacancies can arise unexpectedly.

The wonder of willow: North Notts Wildlife Trust kicks off new season

The North Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust group begins its new season of talks in September with a fascinating exploration of one of our most important native trees.

Tim Sexton, a familiar face to many who visited the Idle Valley during his working years there, will present "The Wonder of Willow" on Thursday 11th September at 7.15pm. Tim conducted research on willow trees during his time at the Idle Valley, making his talk directly relevant to the local area.

"People are often surprised at the importance of the willow tree for wildlife, in particular the vast diversity of insects which are associated with the willow - which can be as many as are found on oak," explains Tim.

His presentation focuses mainly on willow trees at Attenborough Nature Reserve, where he spent a year studying the many species that rely upon them. The talk will cover the history of commercial willow growth in the Trent Valley along with some of the incredible species that Tim discovered during his research.

The North Nottinghamshire Wildlife Trust group has prepared an interesting and varied programme for the new season, focusing on wildlife in the local area and aiming to familiarise audiences with what's happening to wildlife near where they live.

The meeting will be held at Idle Valley Centre starting at 7.15pm. Entry costs £3.00, which includes tea and biscuits. All are welcome and there's no need to book in advance.

Christian perspective: Don't judge

If you are anything like me you will have a tendency to put people into categories as you get to know them. By looking and listening there is this tendency to grade people: clever, scruffy, special needs, poor, wealthy, etc; or perhaps: kind, mean, helpful, useful and lots more ways of viewing people.

Recently I have been reading through the Gospels paying particular attention to the words of Jesus.

I was drawn to this passage in Luke 6:37, 38. It's part of the sermon on the mount and Jesus is speaking. He says,"Do not judge, and you will not be judged. Do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven. Give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together and running over, will be poured into your lap."

There are two instruction about being negative and two regarding positive behaviour, and each one has a response in heaven to the way we behave. So, because we don't know most of what has happened in someone else's life, we are not in any position to judge or especially to condemn. And if we do those things we put ourselves in the position of being open to be judged and condemned in return.

Then there are two positive ones: 'forgive'

and 'give'. Jesus has a lot to say about forgiving others. In fact at the end of the Lord's Prayer he says, "But if you do not forgive others their sins, you Father will not forgive your sins." Matt 6:15

It's a prerequisite for us to receive God's forgiveness that we have a forgiving heart towards others, even when we feel they don't deserve it. We in our turn don't deserve anything from a holy God.

The best part of this discourse of Jesus is this: Give and it will be given to you. When our heavenly Father sees us blessing others as we are able, he gives to us generously everything we need and more. Paul reminds us in 2 Corinthians 9:7 "God loves a cheerful giver."

Jesus then sums up what he has been saying with this final principal of all these things: "For with the measure you use, it will be measured to you."

It's a simple principal – as you give, so you get. However we behave towards others makes a difference to how God treats us. If we leave judgment and condemnation to God, he wil withhold his judgment and condemnation from us.

When we forgive and give generously, then we can free God's hand, as we come by faith in Jesus Christ, to forgive us and to pour abundant blessings into our lives.

The STAR recipe: Cornish Figgy Hobbin

Makes two and will freeze uncooked.

Ingredients:

1lb self-raising flour Good pinch of salt 8oz lard (or white fat) 2 eggs 1½ tablespoons oil

8oz brown sugar 8oz raisins



Rub fat into flour. Beat 1 egg and make up to ½ pint with water, then add to fat and flour.



Knead into a ball and chill for 30 minutes.Divide into 2 and roll each to 8" x

10" x 1/4" thick.

Beat second egg with the oil – use to brush edges of pastry.

Sprinkle sugar and raisins on each pastry, then roll up from long edges and pinch to seal. Brush with rest of

egg and oil. Bake at 425°F / 220°C / Gas Mark 7. Cool and serve with whipped cream.

NB: Can be frozen uncooked - defrost thoroughly before baking. Perfect traditional Cornish treat for afternoon tea or dessert.

September always brings that peculiar back-toschool energy, doesn't it? Even those of us long past the days of new pencil cases and pristine exercise books feel it – that sense that learning season has officially begun.

Which is rather apt, because if recent events have taught us anything, it's that every day really is a school day, and some lessons are more urgent than others.

Lesson one: road safety isn't optional. The motorbike accident in Ranskill has been the talk of the village, and rightly so. It's a stark reminder that whether you're on two wheels or four, behind the wheel or on foot, a moment's inattention can change everything.

Which brings us to lesson two: speed limits aren't suggestions. Someone's been tearing along Mattersey Road in what appears to be a black VW – though frankly, it's rather difficult to identify make or model when something's moving at warp speed.
