Christian Perspective



I've been thinking about sparrows recently—a common little bird. Lots have been nesting in and around our garden and feeding at our bird feeders. I love to see the parent birds

showing the fledglings the 'ropes', like where to find food and water.

I found this on the Natural History Museum website: House sparrows are native to most of Europe, Asia and parts of north Africa. These birds have also colonized most of the world, including the Americas, Australia and New Zealand. They have the biggest range of any wild bird. So sparrows are to be found pretty much everywhere in the world and it's not a bird that many people get excited about. We tend to accept their presence and don't bother much about them.

This is probably why Jesus, when telling the people of the love and care of our Heavenly Father, uses them as an example. Jesus knows there are times when we feel as insignificant as sparrows and he tells us that we are in good company. In the Gospel of Matthew, Jesus said: "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care. And even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows." Matthew 10:29-31 There are things God knows about us that we have no way of knowing about ourselves—like how many hairs are on our heads! Even if we might think we want to know, we have no way of finding out. It reflects the thought of the psalmist who wrote: *How precious* to me are your thoughts, God! How vast is the sum of them! Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand—when I awake, I am still with you. Psalm 139:17,18

What is amazing is how much God thinks about each one of us, not just people, but everything in his creation, and how much he understand about us. It helps us to understand the greatness of who God is. It's also a good basis to grow our faith in his care.

I was struck, also, recently by a verse in Psalm 84. Even the sparrow has found a home, and the swallow a nest for herself, where she may have her young—a place near your altar, LORD Almighty, my King and my God. Blessed are those who dwell in your house; they are ever praising you. Psalm 84:3

God is happy for us to draw near through his Son, Jesus Christ and nest—settle ourselves—close to

the place of worship. When we come in Christ, our Heavenly Father welcomes us into his presence.

Puzzle for October

Burial of the Scrooby Time Capsule 2nd September 2023

The Scrooby Mayflower Time Capsule was laid to rest for 97 years at the Scrooby Show. The capsule was devised by Mike Johnson, our local sculptor. He supervised the loading assisted by Ed Marshall and Rosa Arrowsmith. The resting place was excavated by Mike assisted by Ed, Stephen Lincoln and Norman Gray.

We are very appreciative of all the various items that Scrooby villagers sent for their long interment. Here's a selection from the 200 or so objects, documents and pictures placed in the capsule.

Scrooby People – the latest village photo and individual photos of Scrooby people born in the village.

Mementoes 2 Mason Hier a US airman who lives in Scrooby contributed his 1944 war service medal and some fine memories. A souvenir wood fragment from Mayflower 2. A set of 21st century UK coins.

Scrooby History – a 1972 Ladybird Book The Pilgrim Fathers. 100 year old pictures of Scrooby cottages being renovated. The US Ambassador inaugurating the Village Hall in 1979.

Scrooby Activities – Copies of the STAR including the 1st edition. Photos of zumba in action, knitters knitting, the Scouts camping and an Austin 7.

Souvenirs – A Scrooby mug, a 2022 Scrooby Show Prize Whisky Glass, a commemorative First Day Cover postage stamp from the 350th Mayflower anniversary April 1970. Science experiment – An invitation to time travellers to visit the Show was included. As they didn't appear we can conclude that the secret of time travel has not been mastered. The Parish Council has the full list of contents. Hopefully, they will all still be there for the entertainment of our descendants at the scheduled exhumation on the 500th anniversary of the Mayflower sailing in 2120.

The prize giving culminated with the award of the Rose Bowl for most points overall:



RECIPES to try ...

CHICK PEAS, BACON & CABBAGE - a one-pan meal#

4oz bacon ¹/₂ pint vegetable or chicken stock 1 tblsp wholegrain mustard 1 tblsp oil 2 mell butternut equable as equivalent 1 onion 2 x 400gm tins chick peas ½ green cabbage, shredded Black pepper to season

Small butternut squash or equivalent potato and sweet potato mix

Rough chop onion and bacon - fry in oil till starting to colour

Stir in cubed squash or potatoes and stock – cover and cook till beginning to soften Stir in mustard, chick peas and cabbage till just cooked then season with black pepper

Serve as is or with crusty bread

<u>Alternatively</u> I break up spaghetti and add with squash/potatoes – stir often and watch liquid level. Add little water or liquid from chickpeas if needed, to keep spaghetti moist

PORK PATTIES - your own quantities

Minced pork, dried or fresh sage, salt & pepper Black pudding – cut in ¼" dice Lightly fry onion in oil then mix well, shape and fry

PORK APPLE BURGERS

1lb minced pork (not too lean) 1 tblsp wholegrain mustard Pinch of sage Mix well, shape and fry 1 grated cooking apple 2oz fresh breadcrumbs Salt & pepper



The VIA EM consultation for lower speed limits between Ranskill and through Torworth is still open. The PC has commented that an apparent legacy short section of 40mph immediately after the 30mph ends from Ranskill should be removed at the same time.

FCC Environment at Daneshill have submitted an appeal against the Environmental Agency's refusal of a permit for sorting asbestos contaminated soil.

06/0723: CRIME AND POLICING

The latest crime figures for the beat of Ranskill & Lound to June reported 9 crimes of various types.

07/0723: HIGHWAYS AND TRAFFIC

The PC has been advised by VIA EM that gulley clearance works in the village has now been completed.

08/0723: FINANCE

a) Cash at bank at 30th June: £105,710 of which £54,065 is restricted funds.

b) It was resolved to accept the Internal Auditor's report 2022-23, proposed by Cllr Peel, seconded Cllr Shaw.

c) It was resolved to accept the Annual Governance Statement, proposed by Cllr Shaw, seconded Cllr Brown.

d) It was resolved to accept the Annual Accounting Statement, proposed by Cllr Brown, seconded Cllr Peel.

e) A report was submitted by ClIr Bing in her absence. Replies to our consultation in The Star and social media for the type of equipment to support the proposed playground grant application were very low in number. An ongoing consultation with parents at the school using a google survey has seen more responses, 25 to date and is still running. The application has been submitted, more information supplied such as copies of accounts and the survey is the final supporting document. The PC agrees that up to 10% of the grant total can be funded from reserves.


