Sculpture Working Group member, Steve Lincoln and Sculptor Mike Johnson laying the slab.



Our April speaker, David Fox, will guide us through some of the birds, insects, reptiles, amphibians, plants molluscs and microscopic life we might expect to find on a visit to the pond, especially if we come armed with a pond dipping net.

David is a familiar face at our meetings; he has given talks on a variety of subjects including falconry and Kes. His talk on Pond Life is preparation for a pond-dipping for grownups session which will be organised as part of the Local Group's summer activity

programme. It will probably be held on the Idle Valley Nature Reserve but there may be sessions elsewhere.

Christian Perspective—Love



I've been thinking about the subject of love and what true love really is. We had Valentine's Day in February which some people think of as special to express love to their nearest and dearest. On a

recent Martin Lewis Money Show he asked people to respond on whether they felt Valentine's Day was joyous romantic celebration, or a 'commercialised corporate construct to push us to spend'—and asked the question: Do you spend for Valentines? Almost 68% of the people who responded said they thought it was commercial and they didn't spend. It seems that St. Valentine's Day dates back in some form to Roman times, but the true origin of the holiday is vague at best. Valentine's Day did not come to be celebrated as a day of romance until about the 14th century. There are lots of pop songs and films about this subject of love, which mostly seem to be connected to the physical side. So those are some areas where the world would try to tell us what love is.

But what does the Bible say about love? We have just celebrated Easter, for which many languages use a word that means the Passion—indicating the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. One of the best known verses in the Bible, often quoted, is John 3:16 which reads: For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life.

This speaks to us of the love of God for the world and every person in it, which was so strong that it caused him to give the One who was most precious to him, to save for himself all who would believe. Because God loves, God gave.

So the love of God, in action in the cross, provides us with the only way into his kingdom, into his family. We were separated from God because of our sinful nature and so were his enemies, but by faith in Christ we can enter in and became his friends, his children.

Once we have entered in by faith into this wonderful love of God, we find it in action in many ways. Paul writes in Romans 5:10: For if, while we were God's enemies, we were reconciled to him through the death of his Son, how much more, having been reconciled, shall we be saved through his life!

There is so much to be gained by continuing to trust in him, loving him and loving one another. It opens up for us a whole world of operating in the love of God in our lives. In John's first letter we read that the love of God drives out all fear. We can also rejoice in



this love when times are difficult and we face hard choices in life, when we are pressed down by the acts of those around us. Enter in to the never ending love of God and continue to walk in it daily. It will prove to be a life of joy and purpose.

Puzzle for April

RECIPES to try ...

MARZIPAN LEMON CAKE

6oz SR flour & 6oz plain flour2oz margarine4oz caster sugar3oz golden syrup2 eggs4 tablsp milk

Rind of 1 lemon

Beat all together and spoon 1/2 the mix into a 2lb loaf tin or equivalent

Lay in a sausage shape of 4oz marzipan (ready made is fine) then spoon in rest of cake mix

Bake at 350°F 190°C Mark 5 for 40-45 mins

ICING: Mix juice of 1 lemon with 4oz icing sugar and spread on warm cake

Cool cake in the tin

NB If using a round tin, shape almond paste into a circle

VELVET CHEESECAKE - serves 6-8

BASE:

4oz SR flour 2½ oz butter 1oz icing sugar

Rub butter in flour and sugar then bind with 1 egg yolk*

Chill for 30mins - reserve 1/4 and use the rest to line an 8" flan tin or dish

FILLING:

8oz cottage cheese (sieved) 1oz ground almonds ½ lemon, juice and rind ½ teasp vanilla essence ½ oz softened butter 2oz caster sugar

2 eggs, separated 2oz sultanas

Mix all but the 2 egg whites together till well blended

Beat the egg whites until stiff – fold into the mixture Spoon into the pastry and level with a knife

Roll out remaining piece of pastry and cut into ¼ inch strips – use to decorate in a lattice pattern, dampening ends to seal well to the pastry case

* Beat remaining last egg white to frothy and use to brush over surface of pie

Bake at 350°F 190°C Mark 5 for 40 mins till golden – serve warm
